WE OFFER MANY UPDATES SINCE our last *Messenger*, in fact it is hard to contain all that has happened at MACU in these historic few months. This was definitely a year we will remember. We enter this season with hope and faith that God makes all things new.

The old television show Hee Haw used to have a song that went something like this: "Gloom, despair, and agony on me Deep, dark depression, excessive misery If it weren't for bad luck, I'd have no luck at all Gloom, despair, and agony on me."

This year, at times has caused me to recall that song and to bust out singing. In March we had to send all of our students home due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Our annual Rally and Homecoming were cancelled, our President's Gala was cancelled, on campus recruiting events were cancelled, churches and schools were closed and we were unable to send recruiters out to recruit new students, graduation exercises for the class of 2020 were postponed and we ended up doing a drive-up diploma presentation. We made a choice to have students return to campus in August and resume in class learning. The first Saturday of September hit us with another unexpected blow – the collapse of Heritage Hall. While devastating since we lost all of our classroom and cafeteria facilities, we praised God that our classrooms were empty on that Saturday morning because we would have seen students severely injured or killed. Our hope is not in wood, hay, or stubble – our hope is in the one foundation of Jesus Christ (I Cor. 3:10-11).

The first week of October brought us our first case of Covid-19 as one of our staff members tested positive. Since that time, twenty-three students tested positive for the virus and sixty students/staff/faculty members were quarantined. We continue to

pray for protection and health.

From covid, collapses and saying goodbye to dear friends, 2020 has been a difficult year for MACU, but we move forward in hope and anticipation of what our great God is preparing for us. When we don't know the answers to many questions, we rely on the truth that God wants us to know His word and he is with us through all. We have not stopped teaching the Bible or preparing

extraordinary Christian leaders to serve the church in vocational and voluntary ministry. The highlight of our year was graduating a class of excellent leaders who faced adversity and rose above it. We can't wait for you to meet them in this issue. I echo the words of the Apostle Paul who wrote "We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed" (2 Cor. 4:8-9).

Throughout every circumstance we have worked diligently to give God the glory and praise He is due. Our students have seen hope and faith in these times of chaos and uncertainty which we pray will be a template for them when life gets hard and messy. Our faculty and staff have shown exceptional leadership and adaptability through virtual learning. Our neighbors, churches and businesses have provided meals, food, and



donations – reminding us that people really do care and respond to assist in difficult times. Now more than ever, we want to point the next generation to Christ. We have released a digital tool for young adults called the Explore Life journal to help them navigate their place in this chaotic world.

Martin Luther King, Jr. once said "The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy." Mid-Atlantic stands strong because our faith is in Jesus Christ. Stand with us – and let's see what God is going to do!







Heritage Hall Roof Collapses

ON SEPTEMBER 5, 2020 AT approximately 11:15am our school suffered a major structural collapse of Heritage Hall, our main classroom and cafeteria building. The collapse is in connection with construction and maintenance work on the roof at that time. The student body, staff and faculty were 100% safe and accounted for. We praise God for his protection of our MACU family.

During this time of great uncertainty, we are comforted, encouraged, and humbled by the outpouring of generosity and support from you. We are also thankful for the expertly coordinated response from the Elizabeth City/Pasquotank County Fire Department, Chesapeake Fire Department and Virginia Beach Fire Department for providing excellent response. As many of you know, Heritage was the epicenter of our campus as our main classroom building, cafeteria, mail room, registrar and counseling center. The collapse displaced all classes to alternative areas on our campus or temporary use of the College of the Albemarle campus. Our cafeteria is temporarily moved to the lobby of PAP Hall.

When complications seem to be endless and morale is low, we draw strength from the Kingdom of God. Our problems seem smaller when we think of the eternal kingdom we belong to and the requests we hear from persecuted brothers and sisters around the world. Your encouragement and support remind us that we have a job to do: building the next generation of Christian leaders. And

they are getting an unintended education in resilience and perseverance!

A few updates to keep in prayer:

We have weekly discussions with our insurance providers in the Heritage collapse situation. Currently, the provider feels we can do a partial rebuild of the second story of Heritage. A rebuilding timeline instead of all new construction would be great. However, the months of weather damage that may have affected other parts of the building is concerning. We continue working with third party engineers to confirm viability of a partial rebuild versus demolition.

We have selected our builder as Church Development Services and intend to build a separate building for cafeteria or classrooms (depending on cost) immediately as our "loss of operation plan". This building would be located where "Old Presley" was located and will serve us while we continue discussions for the Heritage Hall rebuild.

As we gather more information from insurance and builders we will be planning a capital campaign to rebuild our campus. Project total is expected to be approximately \$4 million dollars. We are planning for an intended campaign goal of \$1.5 million to fill gaps of insurance reimbursement.

Thank you for praying. Thank you for giving. Thank you for standing with us. We stand together, knowing "our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all" (2 Cor. 4:17).





WE OPENED THE CAMPUS ON August 10 for the 2020-2021 fall semester. Wearing masks, remaining distanced and constant sanitizing have become a normal part of the summer months to allow for more space by repurposing the press building into the Roanoke Press, where coffee time, homework and activities can be held. Donations of time and lumber brought new outdoor spaces and picnic areas.

On September 28, 2020 we had our first Covid-19 outbreak. With 23 students and staff as covid positive, we quarantined over 60 students and staff to ensure contact was reduced. Our students and staff moved to online classes even if they remained on campus. We are grateful the outbreak was held to a smaller number and continue to pray for health and protection for all. Thank you to the students, churches, volunteers and staff that stepped in to care for others in their time of need. Thank you especially to our MACU housekeeping staff who have gone above and beyond!





THINKING BIBLICALLY

God Knows Both Light and Darkness

MY DAD USED TO SAY to me, "Son, there are two kinds of people in the world ..."; then he would complete the thought with some pair of opposites. (Incidentally, his most common pairing was "givers" and "takers.") This pairing of opposites, called a "merism" by scholars, is common in the Bible. A merism uses two polar opposites to name those two items and everything in between.

Isaiah used the merism of light and darkness in six verses, one of which is Isaiah 45:7. In each of the pairings, the meanings are metaphorical: light is a positive concept and darkness a negative one.

Isaiah 45:1–7 is the first part of a poem that works as a play: (1) the Lord is the speaker. (2) He speaks to Cyrus, the Persian king, who 150 years later would allow the Jews to return the Promised Land. (3) Israel is present and witnessing the interaction. We may outline it this way: Setting (v. 1), Prediction to Cyrus as the Instrument of the Lord (vv. 2–3), The Absolute Uniqueness of the Lord to Predict Such Things (vv. 4–7).

The Lord reveals this prophecy to Israel, who had struggled with idolatry for centuries, so that they will know that there is no other God (v. 6). Verse 7 is an emphatic statement about who the Lord is in three lines. The first line uses the metaphors of light and darkness: as Creator, he forms them. The second line clarifies that the Lord is speaking about more than physical light and darkness; he is speaking of light as prosperity and darkness as disaster. Finally, he says, "I, the Lord, do all these things."

Before the outbreak of the virus this year, the US economy was arguably the greatest in the history of the world. The stock market was setting record highs. Unemployment was very low with minority unemployment at all-time record lows. Consumer confidence was high. The number of people in the workforce was high and increasing. Wages were rising. Inflation was low. Fewer people needed welfare and other subsidies. This was the "light" of prosperity. We thanked God for that.

Despite differences in opinions of medical


experts and politicians about how best to proceed, the unprecedented action of massive lockdowns took place in March. The consequence of the lockdown was precipitous. Besides the deaths of thousands due to the virus, millions lost their incomes, savings, and livelihoods. To top this off, lawless riots, sometimes supported by government leaders, ravaged public and private property in numerous cities across the country. This was the darkness of disaster. We pray to God for relief.

This passage taught the Israel of Isaiah's day that bad times were in the future, but the Lord was in it. It taught the returning Jews 150 years after this prophecy that times may be tough, but there is a light, and the Lord is in it. Isaiah 45 still teaches us that human history is full of good times and bad. Jesus said, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). The Lord is still in it!

Thanks For Asking

THIS HAS BEEN A TRANSFORMATIVE year for MACU. With this has come more conversations with the people we care about most, our alumni, our former staff, our students, supporters, and churches. We have had some encouraging words and some hard questions. I would always rather answer questions than misunderstand each other... so thanks for asking!

- IS MACU A LIBERAL ARTS UNIVERSITY OR A BIBLE COLLEGE?
- A Hmmmm, no and yes? We require a minimum of 18 hours of Biblical Study courses (an academic "minor") which is not in alignment with a Liberal Arts philosophy (typically the liberal arts college focuses upon a breadth of courses in fields such as religion, philosophy, literature, math, science, psychology and sociology). Most of our graduates receive a double major (i.e. Business Administration and Biblical Studies; Youth and Family Ministry and Biblical Studies, etc.). A "major" requires 30 semester hours of study. In addition, every course taught at MACU is taught from a Biblical worldview. We have expanded our degree options so we can have biblically trained professionals serving in a wide variety of vocations. Our goal is to build the future of the Church (big C). We want ministers everywhere. Our heartbeat and history stand with training ministry leaders, but honestly, we have some work to do as a culture and as a church to "call forth" more ministry professionals. Very few young leaders were applying for those focuses, so we expanded. Our motto is "Set for the defense of the gospel" and we believe that every Christian, in every vocation, is a minister of Christ. Barna Research reported that over 90% of highschoolers have never met a missionary and never thought about ministry as a profession We think we can change that. The next generation is extremely passionate about their faith and career, we build both.

- IS MACU TOO FOCUSED ON SPORTS?
- A In all honesty, we did what every small college in America perceived as a best practice around 2012, in response to the American obsession with youth sports. We built more opportunities to play sports and go to college. This helped enrollment in all small colleges. However, we realized in 2018 that this is not a sustainable solution for education or ministry and made an organizational shift to refocus our enrollment efforts. Watching the tragic closing of our sister school Cincinnati Christian University, strengthened our resolve. Our scholarships are
 - structured towards ministry and academics rather than athletics.
 We love sports! We love the way sports unites our student body with a positive focus and helps forge teamwork and strength of character. Mustang nation is strong, but our mission comes first!
- IS MACU A PART OF THE "RESTORATION MOVEMENT" ANYMORE?
- A We truly believe that there are competent amazing Church leaders we can learn from outside of the Restoration Movement. We also believe that the principles and heritage of the Restoration Movement are what we are founded on and relate closest to in a Biblical context. To be clear, 9 out of 13 full time teaching faculty are from the Restoration Movement and every ministry and Bible faculty member must be from the Restoration Movement.

 Every member of the Board of Trustees must be from a Restoration Church.

 Every employee must sign our statement

of faith (which is the same one we have used since 1948). We accept students from a variety of Christian backgrounds because they want to come to MACU for a Biblical education. To graduate from MACU every student must take and pass the course "The History of the Restoration Movement." Our supporters, camps, events, and connected churches are overwhelmingly from the Restoration Movement. We think that is important. We have also built strong and diverse relationships with faith builders in our community as we engage the culture around us as Jesus did. We are proud of our heritage and are committed to simple New Testament Christianity.

TRISH GRIFFIN LOVED AND SERVED the Lord in all areas of her life. We were especially blessed that she spent many years serving all of us at Mid-Atlantic Christian University. As the wife of longtime professor, Bill Griffin, who became the second president of the school in 1986, she supported him in all of his endeavors, traveling with him to appointments, hosting campus guests, welcoming students and alumni into their home, representing the school in many settings as the president's wife.

As the director of the library for 41 years (1963-2004), she oversaw its growth from 9,100 volumes to nearly 33,000 items by 2004, including the growing collection of electrimedia. Her achievements include designing the current library, assisted by reference librarian Nancy Vossmeyer; orchestrating the library's relocation to

that new facility, the retrospective digital conversion of the card catalog; a flawless review by an accreditation team; recognition from her fellow librarians; and excellent service to her library patrons.

As a teacher, she taught her students with knowledge and experience, passion, organization, and expectations. She demonstrated for her students what she was teaching them to do by the quality of her teaching both in the classroom and in the church and by assisting those who wished to

establish libraries for their congregations.

As a mentor, she served the campus women, both single and married, with various Bible studies, social gatherings, ministry sessions, fellowship meals, and craft groups. She was the faculty sponsor of Roanoke Wives, fostering spiritual growth and fellowship and sharing practical knowledge in homemaking skills.

Trish Griffin lived every moment as a "teachable moment." We are all better for having known and loved her.
