GOD CAN USE SOMEONE LIKE YOU?



Several years ago I was channel surfing and came across a speaker named David Ring. His severe disability was obvious as he shared his amazing testimony. When David was born, he was dead for 18 minutes. His father died when he was very young. His mother died of cancer when he was 14. David was passed from family to family and faced a myriad of challenges, including cerebral palsy.

But David chooses not to be a victim and not to seek pity. He speaks to more than 100,000 people a year, is married, and has children and grandchildren. David recounts being called to preach, saying his response was, "But God, I have cerebral palsy."

When God calls us to serve Him, it is easy to pile up excuses. I am too young, too old, too incompetent, too unprepared, and the list goes on. David's point is that if anyone has a good excuse not to serve God as a preacher, it is a person with cerebral palsy.

Have you ever looked at your life and wondered if God could ever use someone like you? It is easy to feel unqualified, focusing on what you lack rather than what God can do. However, the resounding answer from scripture and history is, "Yes, He can, and He will." In fact, God specializes in using ordinary, flawed people to do extraordinary things.

God's grace is greater than your mistakes, your past, or your insecurities. The Bible is not a storybook of perfect people; it is a catalog of broken individuals used by a perfect God.

- Moses was a murderer with a speech impediment.
- David was an adulterer and a murderer.
- Rahab was a prostitute.
- Peter denied Jesus three times.
- Paul persecuted Christians before becoming one.

If God could use them, He can use you. Your past sins or present brokenness do not disqualify you. They simply make you a candidate for His grace.

You do not need to be like anyone else to serve God. God will use your specific, unique experiences, even the difficult ones, to accomplish His purposes. If you feel too messed up, too small, or too average, you are exactly the type of person God loves to use to show His strength. About forty percent of ministers leave the ministry within five years. The next dropout milestone is around ten to fifteen years. Yet here we are, nearing our fifteenth year of professional ministry, faithful to Jesus' calling on our lives because of two enduring influences:

the empowerment of the Holy Spirit and the lasting impact of Mid-Atlantic Christian University.

MACU's influence began before I even knew MACU existed. I wanted to go into youth ministry because of the influence of my youth minister, Mick Buchanan. The fact that he was a MACU graduate made choosing a school easy, so this Hoosier made his way to North Carolina. Meanwhile, Amanda wanted to pursue a professional licensed counseling degree. She started at a community college but was influenced to continue her studies at MACU by her former executive-minister-turned-president-of-MACU, Dr. Clay Perkins. Amanda and I met on the second day of freshman orientation. MACU didn't just influence our ministries. It also brought us together.

Amanda and I agree that our longevity in ministry, aside from the Holy Spirit, can be attributed to MACU in two ways. The first is the education we received. We were blessed to be taught by amazing, knowledgeable professors. For Amanda, the combination of counseling, ministry, and Bible classes prepared her for her current role, working as a licensed counselor for Christian Counseling Associates, which functions not just as a counseling center, but also as a genuine ministry. The conversations she had with professors McKinney and Greene helped her to be a professional, to love people the way Jesus did, and to apply biblical truth to her clients.

For me, every piece of knowledge I received has been a resource to succeed in ministry: how to run a ministry, how to lead a team,

how to put together a sermon, even using the devotionals I wrote for Dr. Bob in Western Civilization. I received a second education from MACU when I worked there for three years as the campus minister/student life director, enabling me not only to work for, but also to be mentored by Dr. Ken Greene. I believe I can do ministry because of him. MACU truly trained us to be the counselor and ministers we are today.

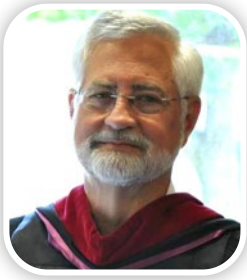
The second way – and to us, the most important way – MACU contributed to our ministry is the people MACU brought into our lives. Amanda and I found each other. Three professors were in our wedding. Our first ministry opportunity was given to us by a MACU alumnus. When ministry got hard, professors reached out. When Amanda's mom passed away, professors reached out, and MACU became a resting place for her while dealing with that loss. Amanda and I met our "family" (friends who became family) at MACU. They are our best friends and encouragers. We have weathered the highs and lows of life together, even though Amanda and I live 516 miles away. Dr. King was hired after our time as students, yet he still helped Amanda during her provisional license phase. MACU gave us a wonderful education, but the people have enabled us to thrive.

Amanda and I are doing what Jesus called us to do fifteen years ago. She is a licensed professional counselor, and I am a lead minister at a church in Ohio. Ministry has not been the easiest profession, but we remain faithful, and God remains faithful. We are grateful for the education and resources MACU gave us, and even more grateful for the people from MACU who love us and whom we love in return.

A GOOD CONSCIENCE IS EXERCISED

Thinking Biblically about a Good Conscience: Part 3

Developing a Good Conscience (Acts 24:16)

Parts one and two of this article, published in previous Messengers, considered that a “good” conscience must be educated and effective. Part Three considers two goals God had in mind for a good conscience to accomplish. Everyone has muscles, but we vary in the extent to which we exercise them. Similarly, it is not enough simply to have a conscience. We must exercise it.

In Hebrews 5:11-14, the writer rebukes some who were not maturing. To urge them to improve, he uses a word picture, referring to those who “by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil.” The Greek word translated “trained” is the basis for our English word “gymnasium.” The writer is reminding them that just as athletes must exercise their muscles, Christians must exercise their conscience.

Two Christian businessmen, Bob Rowling and Jim Caldwell, exercised their conscience. In 1996, when Bob Rowling purchased the Omni Hotel Chain, he discovered that adult pay-per-view movies were in use. That year guests spent about \$175 million watching adult movies. Since hotels keep 20% of this total, it was a significant source of income.

Guests could block these movies, but that was not enough for Rowling. Little did he know how difficult and expensive this decision would be. Removing the movies was a four-year, \$4 million ordeal. Existing contracts had to expire first, followed by resistance from the movie providers. None wanted to provide any movie service unless adult movies were included since they provided 50% of the profits.

Finally, Rowling found a provider who would tailor a package for him. But that meant replacing the televisions in all 9,100 hotel rooms because Omni’s previous provider had donated them. It cost \$4 million to replace them, plus \$3 million more in lost revenue from the adult movie business. It cost Rowling a lot to exercise his conscience.

Rowling said, “Although we considered the cost of doing this, we didn’t focus on the money so much. We’re both believers, so we try to run our business in a manner that honors our faith and our God.” Caldwell added, “Money was not the issue in this matter. Every business decision should not be fiscally driven. We believe this is the right thing to do, the right thing for Omni Hotels, our associates, and our customers.”

Since this decision became public, Rowling has received over 30,000 messages commending him for his moral courage. These two men who exercised their conscience and did the right thing had a positive impact not only on themselves, but also on others who might have failed to exercise their conscience in the face of temptation. A good conscience is not only educated and effective, but also exercised.

What do you do if you have ignored your conscience and sinned against God’s Law? The only way to be freed from a guilty conscience is by putting your faith in Jesus Christ, who shed His blood as a sacrifice for our sins (Hebrews 10:22-25).

I'm not a minister, but I think I do some holy work.

For much of the past two decades I've written and edited stories for either the main newspaper of Southwest Virginia or one of the largest universities in the state.

I've reported on everyone from elementary school spelling bee contestants and college athletes to local, state, and federal officials, and even a few people accused of crimes.

My most recent work focuses on telling stories of Virginia Tech researchers and their efforts to make life better. Through advancements in areas ranging from biomedical engineering and child psychology to 3D printing, AI, and national security, they're doing great things, and I get to help extend the benefits to others through story.

Telling stories can be a holy experience. Interviewing provides another human the opportunity to put words to all the thoughts and feelings rolling around inside them. Writing is all about sharing that person's insights in a way that allows others to find meaning for their own lives. It is work that hinges on the ability to truly value people, both subjects and readers.

For me, this is rooted in a belief that all people are made in God's image, and I should love them as myself. No matter who a person is, what they do, or what they believe, I think there's something good and relatable in them. I think they are worth both listening to and writing for.

I try to approach interview subjects with a combination of dignity and curiosity to help best reveal their true selves. I try to understand life from their position, while also connecting it to our shared experience. My writing and editing are done with the goal of creating something worth another person's time. I believe that no matter if it's a sermon or a feature film, the time folks spend with our content is part of their lives they can never get back. We honor that by ensuring it is accessible, accurate, and some combination of informative, inspirational, or entertaining. In my field this means pushing aside any worry of looking dumb or invasive to ask questions needed for clarity, chasing down those best sources and voices, and fact-checking aggressively.

I couldn't say my time at MACU put me on a direct path to this career, but I can say the people I met there played a critical role in how I view others, this world, and how we interact with one another. I can also say that Professor Donald McKinney's keys to good counseling – genuineness, empathy, and positive regard – routinely show up when I'm invited to speak to college journalism classes.

After graduating in 2005, I went through a few different fields while always dabbling in communications on the side. Eventually, this passion was too great to ignore. I quit my job as a middle school history teacher and got one writing high school box scores in the middle of the night at *The Roanoke Times*. A year and countless misspelled names later, I shifted to a full-time role and began to cultivate the relationships and reporting that would launch my career in this field.

My career has allowed me to sit with people who hold a wide range of skills, beliefs, and worldly status, and work alongside great people from all walks of life. I think my approach has allowed me to develop many of these encounters into a beautifully diverse network of friends and acquaintances.

I don't shy away from sharing my faith, but I've come to realize the greater impression is almost always made by showing up ready to listen and help. I actually can't tell you

the last time I initiated a conversation about faith, but I also can't count the number of times I've been on the opposite end of a subject or co-worker's curiosity about Christianity or the church.

I hope that's the value others will find in my story. I hope they leave it a little more curious about Jesus than before they heard it.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION REIGNITES ENGAGEMENT



The Mid-Atlantic Christian University (MACU) Alumni Association reunited its members at a meeting held during homecoming in October. At this gathering, an executive committee was established, marking an exciting step forward as the association resumes active engagement with the university and its community.

The executive committee is currently organizing committees to expand alumni involvement and strengthen collaboration with churches connected to the university. One key focus of these committees is addressing the growing need for ministry leadership positions within Christian churches and churches of Christ by holding interest meetings in several churches that have alumni who can build alumni chapters.

MACU currently provides a platform on its website where churches can post available ministry positions. These openings align closely with the university's academic offerings, including ministry and preaching degrees and a Professional Christian Ministry Certificate that prepares students to serve in church leadership roles. Recognizing the strong demand for qualified ministry leaders, the alumni association aims to help bridge the gap between churches seeking leadership and graduates prepared to serve.

A central objective of the association's efforts is the establishment of regional alumni chapters. By creating structure through the executive committee and its sub-committees, these chapters will strengthen relationships among the university, congregations, alumni, and prospective students. These alumni chapters will foster collaboration among alumni, churches, and Christian leaders to help identify, prepare, and support the next generation of spiritual leaders, ministers, and servants of Christ. Through mentorship, networking, and ministry partnerships, alumni can play a direct role in guiding students and young leaders toward meaningful service in the church.

The long-term goal for the alumni chapters is to fill their current ministry vacancies, support Mid-Atlantic Christian University in student recruitment, and ensure that any funds raised by each chapter are directed toward scholarships for members within the churches that make up that chapter. These resources will help provide financial assistance to students from those congregations who choose to attend the university, strengthening the connection between local churches and the institution while supporting the development of future ministry leaders.

Through these efforts, the MACU Alumni Association seeks to build a stronger network that supports churches, encourages students, and advances the mission of preparing leaders for ministry.

Today we find ourselves in one of those defining moments. To meet this year's obligations and position the university for long-term stability, we must raise \$815,000 before June 30, 2026. This goal addresses immediate operational needs and essential campus improvements that directly affect our students' quality of life.

These funds will not only close the remaining gap in our annual operating budget, but also address critical deferred maintenance, including replacing HVAC units in residence halls, repairing the Blanton Center roof to prevent further structural damage, completing elevator repairs and ADA upgrades, and strengthening our IT infrastructure to improve connectivity and security. These are not cosmetic upgrades. They are investments in safety, accessibility, comfort, and the overall quality of campus life. Our facilities shape student morale, influence family confidence, and impact retention.

When this college was founded, faculty and staff built much of what we still use today. That pioneering spirit shaped our identity. Today, however, building codes, OSHA regulations, and compliance requirements require licensed professionals and significant financial investment. Responsible stewardship means addressing needs before they become larger problems. Deferred maintenance left unaddressed grows more costly and disruptive. Addressed now, it preserves our mission and strengthens student life for the next generation.

CAN GOD USE A UNIVERSITY LIKE MACU AND A CHURCH LIKE YOURS?

Churches of Christ in Eastern North Carolina in 1948 were so short of ministers that most had preaching only one or two Lord's days each month. It was not unusual for one minister to serve four or even six churches. This shortage was caused when a once-loyal ministerial school serving the area began teaching German rationalism or "modernism." Without the challenge of a divine Christ, few ministerial students entered and fewer graduated from this college, and once churches realized what was being taught, many refused to use graduates of that school.

Congregations had died, and others were weak spiritually, numerically, and financially. Meeting places consisted generally of small frame structures with plain auditoriums for worship and few Bible school rooms. To answer this need, Roanoke Bible College was conceived early in 1948 and began classes that September.

From the school's beginning, the vitality of the college and the area churches was intertwined. Student preachers filled pulpits. Congregations prayed for the school, sent financial support, and welcomed teams of freshmen who would visit to preach, teach, and sing. They realized they were helping future generations to have well trained men and women serving in their churches and communities.

Seaford Christian Church in Seaford, VA, is one congregation with a longstanding relationship with MACU. Gregg Breisch, Sr., and his wife, Shirley, were in the group that helped form the congregation in 1975. Dave Cuthbertson, a 1970 graduate, was the minister for the new church planted by Olivet Christian Church, Newport News, VA. More alumni preachers followed – David Willis '90, Jason Thornton '99, and the current minister, Chris Cuthbertson '97, son of the first preacher. Alumni youth ministers include Scooter Breisch '94 (first full-time youth minister), Myron Williams '99, and Jena McDaniel Cumming ex'07.

Scooter and his sister Gina '00, children of a founding couple, are two of the students from the church who received financial support from Seaford to attend a Bible college. Gina, the first baby born into the new congregation, continues to worship at Seaford today. Scooter works in student services and admissions at MACU and is the resident hall director for the men. Other alumni are also from Seaford.

Seaford has been blessed by graduates serving them, and the school has been blessed by the congregation's faithful financial support and by their youth who have attended. It is one of many congregations that God has used to help grow His Kingdom. We invite your congregation to partner with us, also.



On Nov. 1, members of the Seaford church welcomed Vice President for Institutional Advancement Amy Alcocer at a breakfast gathering. Alcocer thanked the members for their faithful support and shared an update on the university's ministry. She was especially excited to hear about the many connections among the members, some who had attended the university themselves and others who have relatives who are current or former students. Alcocer noted that these stories highlight the deep, personal investment stakeholders have in the university.

WOOLARD RETIREMENT, CLASSROOM DEDICATION

From the fall of 1974 through December of 2025 – 51.5 years – Professor Ronnie Woolard has shared his passion for the Bible with students. The old and new testaments came to life in his survey classes and specialty courses. Professor Woolard has also taught a number of theology courses and other Bible related courses. Some of his more well known include Bible Evidences,

Christian Ethics, and Science and the Bible. The era of his full-time teaching closed in December, but he continues teaching part time as Professor of Bible Emeritus.

Professor Woolard honed his work ethic growing up on a small farm in eastern North Carolina. Devout parents instilled in him a pursuit of honest and worthy service, which was obvious in his high school and scouting careers. Faithfully attending church helped establish a foundation for his life's work of teaching Bible, ministry, and service. During his first 30 years of teaching, he taught full-time and served three different congregations. His third and final ministry was from 1988 to 2004 with a new congregation, Towne South Church of Christ. His wife, Trish, served the three congregations alongside her husband.

In addition to teaching and preaching, Professor Woolard worked as the college printer for nearly 20 years. He regularly attended student activities and answered calls for "all hands on deck" for countless campus projects. Trish also worked for the college (25 years), and together they served as sponsors for several classes and produced end-of-year comedies and dramas.

In all this service to others, Professor Woolard recognized his family as the main priority. Dr. Kevin Larsen, vice president for academic affairs, noted in his remarks at Professor Woolard's retirement celebration, "While the extent of people that have encountered God through Professor Woolard's teaching and

preaching will never be known, what we can quantify is the legacy that he has made and continues to make through his family. As a husband to his wife Trish, he has faithfully led their marriage. Unlike many fathers in scripture who neglected their children, Ronnie, along with Trish, has raised amazing faithful servants of God in their children, Tara and Eric. Ronnie and Trish, we say thank you for modeling for all of us how to have a healthy Christian home."

Throughout Professor Woolard's tenure, his students, the university, and the Board of Trustees have bestowed various honors on him. Several times he was named the yearbook dedicatee by the senior class. Other notable honors include receiving an honorary doctorate degree, retiring with the designation "Emeritus," and having a classroom in Heritage Hall named in honor of him and his wife.

"Your daily actions and words of wisdom to me and so many others helped to shape my faith in untold ways."

"He taught me much about the Bible, but more about being a man, husband, father, and follower of Jesus."

"When he taught us the Old Testament, he did it with such enthusiasm you could almost feel as though you were right there on the battlefield alongside David facing Goliath."

SKULTETY GARNERS ANOTHER INTERNATIONAL OPPORTUNITY FOR MACU STUDENTS



Dr. Patrik Skultety participated in securing a grant that covers two trips per year to Europe for three individuals, fully funded. This grant creates space for academic enrichment, intercultural dialogue, and meaningful Christian impact abroad and here at home.

Dr. Skultety submitted the grant in partnership with the University of Prešov (UNIPO) under a European Union program focused on cross-cultural studies and education. He stated that for him, “This is far more than an academic achievement. It is the result of many years of international work, relationships, and service in education across continents. My long-term mission has always been to open global doors for our students – not only academically and professionally, but spiritually and culturally as well.”

MACU students or faculty selected for the trip will be able to represent Christ-centered education internationally, to build bridges across cultures, and to demonstrate how faith and scholarship can work together. Three current biology majors (Bleckley, Miller, Stinson), two alumni (Travis Snell, Carrington Townes), my research assistant Nick Stuart, three of my collaborators (Theresa Hartsell, M.D., Ph.D., Susan Gardlik, Ph.D., Steven Volla, MPH) and I are co-authors [of the four studies accepted for presentation].”

In addition to teaching at MACU, Dr. Pace is Chief Scientific Officer of FleurirABX, LLC, a biotechnology company based in the United States and France. He is an infectious disease microbiologist possessing more than 30-years postgraduate biotech/pharma and academic experience in the US, France, and Denmark. He is a creationist, while being a world class scientist and training MACU students accordingly in the biological sciences. His perspective is, “God is the ultimate molecular biologist, and I am blessed to have the opportunity to teach students about some of God’s greatest creations.”

SOMEONE LIKE ME?

Huguens Mercier ex'12

U.S. Army Chaplain, stationed in Texas



The story of international student Huguens Mercier is a testimony to God's willingness to use for His glory and purpose a person who offers himself in service to the Lord.

Huguens Mercier enrolled in MACU in the spring of 2009, thanks to a providential encounter with H.O. "Chip" Chesson in December of 2007, who shared the following account.

I went on a mission trip to Haiti with Family Health Ministries, a non-profit dedicated to improving the health of underserved communities around the world. On this trip, I met a special young Haitian named Huguens Mercier. Huguens lived in the slum of Cite Soleil, a section of Haiti occupied by 80,000 and built on top of a landfill.

When he was five, Huguens' parents brought him to his pastor and said that they couldn't feed him any longer. Over the years, the pastor did his best to support him. Now 18, Huguens began dreaming of something bigger – studying in America to become a Christian minister like the pastor of his Haitian church. I talked with him about a small Christian bible college that my parents helped found in the 1940's, but with no resources other than the clothes on his back, his dreams were hardly achievable.

After the visit, I learned that a week after I was there, Huguens was the victim of a random shooting while walking home from school. His pastor called me with regular updates on his condition, and although he was not expected to live, he did.

I was attracted to Huguens because of his remarkable will and determination. Despite his hardship, he graduated from high school, learned English, and initiated taking the TOEFL (English proficiency) test twice in order to pursue his college dreams. But even with these tools, he had no money, no support, no scholarship of any kind. Most in his circumstances

would have given up on their dreams long ago. In May of 2008, I received a call from New York. It was Huguens, who, along with his father, had received a green card and admission to the US. He had a part-time job and was attending Brooklyn College studying English. He asked again about the bible college I had mentioned. On his own initiative, he contacted the school, visited and took an entrance exam, and was admitted. But again, he had no resources, beyond his determination. Huguens had an undying faith that God would provide, and that he was going to serve God as a pastor, despite those that told him, "Your dream is too big."

Inspired by his determination, I decided to raise the tuition for Huguens' first semester at Roanoke and then let him apply for whatever financial aid he might receive beyond that point. He began classes in January of 2009. His professors said he was a model student, one with a hunger for learning and a love of Christian teachings.

Huguens continued his studies beyond MACU, eventually earning a divinity degree. He married his Haitian school sweetheart, Lovely. They and their two children live in Texas, where he is a chaplain in the U. S. Army.
