# Roanoke Graduates Serve by Counseling

### 'And He will be called Wonderful Counselor'

Offering comfort to the hurting and confused, pointing those who are troubled in the right direction, encouraging some to accept responsibility and to make a change, and providing resources for all of the above are just a few of the reasons some Roanoke graduates choose counseling as their field of service. Four alumni who are serving God as counselors share their work and observations.

### Cindy Styons Thomas '78, LPC, LCAS

Albemarle Mental Health Center Hertford, NC

Cindy is a mental health counselor with Albemarle Mental Health Center, providing adult and child services with mental health and substance abuse needs. She serves as the crisis counselor and provides consults for local physicians, law enforcement, district court, the Department of Social Services, and public schools. Cindy credits her education in Biblical studies and counseling at Roanoke with helping to develop her world view. "Knowing the mercy and love of our Father and the great length He went for me and others



completely affects my view of others and how I serve them.... Each day when I go to work I go to serve Him.... I am there for Him to use, to minister to many that will not darken the door of a church. They often are the unlovely and unloved of this community, and I pray that they can see Him through me and that they are drawn to Him."



#### Kevin Coward '98, LPC

Christian Psychotherapy Services (CPS) Virginia Beach, VA

Kevin served over six years with Forefront Christian Church in Virginia Beach as Pastoral Counselor, providing marriage and family counseling. For the past two and a half years he has worked fulltime with CPS. He commends Roanoke for the excellent foundation he received for graduate studies at Regent University, noting that he used some of the same textbooks he had used at Roanoke. CPS has five offices in Hampton Roads and the Eastern Shore, with 52

#### Preachers of the Month

He has also served Union Grove (Pantego, NC); Trinity (Winton, NC); and Acre Chapel (Plymouth, NC), where he has been for eight years. His favorite quote is found in Luke 4:43, where Jesus says, "I must preach the good news of the Kingdom of God." He and Mary Ann have four children, eight grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.

**Phillip M. Paul '88** was ordained by his home church, St. Clair's Church of Christ, Bath, NC, in 1986 while he was still a student. #### Professor McKinney . . .

While most colleges and universities have undergraduate degrees in psychology, an undergraduate degree in counseling is typically found only in our Bible colleges. Our former students often email to say how well prepared they are.

Several have mentioned that some of their textbooks are the same ones they have used at RBC. Many of the courses we offer at an undergraduate level, like Introduction to Counseling, Counseling Theories, Crisis Counseling, and others, are the same courses they study at a graduate level at all approved graduate schools.

I have also talked with many of our graduates who are using their degree from RBC immediately after graduation. Some have worked in schools, others in the church, and others have worked with troubled youth as mentors and case workers.

The great thing about a minor in counseling at RBC is that it supplements so well the ability to do ministry in other areas. We find that many of our students who want to be preachers, youth ministers, or Christian leaders believe they will be more effective if they also have training in counseling. At Roanoke Bible College you can receive a well-rounded education that will prepare you for ministry in a variety of ways.

# Reports from the Field: A sampling of RBC around the World

Robert and Mari-Etta Reese were missionaries in Zimbabwe from 1981-2002. They were part of a church planting team that started new churches in western Zimbabwe. Their sponsoring congregation was Northside Church of Christ in Santa Ana, CA, which later merged with First Christian Church of Irvine and became Creekside Christian Fellowship. Since 2002, Robert has led a number of short-term mission teams from Creekside to Zimbabwe. This article is part of a description of the mission trip he conducted with three leaders from Creekside this summer. The object of the trip was twofold: to gain an understanding of the current crisis in Zimbabwe in order to see how to encourage Zimbabwean Christians and to conduct a Bible school held annually for rural pastors. Dr. Reese's first impression of Zimbabwe came a couple of hours before he arrived there: on a bus at the Johannesburg (South Africa) airport, as we passengers were being ferried out to our small plane for the daily flight to Bulawayo, I spotted a pastor whom I knew from our time as missionaries in Bulawayo. He looked much older than I expected and had a worried expression. When I approached him, his reaction was to tell me how brave I was to be going to Zimbabwe at such a time. He said his own family had been begging him not to return. When I asked

why, he glanced over his shoulder to see who might be listening and said that the government had begun targeting church leaders in the same way they have been targeting the opposition party, with violent reprisals. What had he been doing that drew the attention of the authorities in such a negative way? He had been helping widows and orphans who were adversely affected by the political situation and the worsening economic collapse.

This was the first time I had heard such accusations against the government, but my month in Zimbabwe confirmed that the current government perceives most of its own people as enemies of the state. And certainly foreigners may come under suspicion for little actual reason. For example, for the whole month I was in Zimbabwe, all foreign organizations that distribute food, medicine, and other aid had been shut down. We had made an appointment to visit World Vision, but discovered that all their offices were closed and staff sent on leave. Their vehicles were locked up in gated compounds. The reason was similar to what caused the government to harass a peaceful pastor: they assumed such groups swayed rural folks to vote against the government.

How did this affect short-term missions? . . . Note: Read the rest of the story at www. roanokebible.edu. Dr. Reese concludes his article with this encouragement:

What never ceases to amaze me is how the Zimbabweans cope with adversity. Particularly Christians are able to draw on reserves that others do not have, using the strength that God provides in order to continue serving Him and bringing the good news of freedom in Christ to those who are burdened beyond belief.

### Dr. Lee Fields attended the final meeting of the CoHeLeT (Communicative Hebrew Learning and Teaching) Project in Ohio in June. This three-year project,

headed by Dr. Paul Overland of Ashland Theological Seminary and funded by the Wabash Center for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion, sought to apply lessons learned from

second language acquisition to teaching biblical Hebrew. The CoHeLeT team included people from the United States, Israel, and Brazil. Dr. Fields was part of the field test team that used materials developed by design team members in his Hebrew class during the 2007-08 school year.

To maximize comprehension, biblical Hebrew students at RBC engaged all four language skills: hearing, speaking, reading, and writing, plus TPR (Total Physical Response), in which they actively participated in the learning process. The June 2008 meeting determined results and began preparation of a presentation at the National Association of Hebrew Professors for the Society of Biblical Literature in Boston in November 2008. Dr. Fields is also working with two members of the Project on an article to publish results.

# **Treading Where Christians Have Gone Before**

This summer two RBC rising sophomores, Andrew Bromm and Stephen Brooks, toured Biblical and Christian heritage sites in Israel for a week and excavated for three weeks on the Abila of the Decapolis expedition with Dr. Bob Smith. The students experienced life as Christians working in a rural Muslim village and learned about how believers from earlier eras lived their faith in the land of the Bible. The focus of this season's expedition was to complete the excavation of church buildings. The remains of these buildings testify to the continuation of the Christian community at Abila from the Byzantine era up to the end of the Umayyad era when they were destroyed by an earthquake in AD 748.

Stephen Brooks' probe along the exterior wall of the largest church building down in the heart of the city shows its development from a pagan temple to a basilica to being a marble-floored structure with five aisles that was completed after the Islamic conquest of the region in AD 635. Andrew Bromm worked on a church located up on the tell (hill). Beyond artifacts, he found that it was hard to leave new friends, as well as unfinished work when his time to return arrived.

After the students returned to the United States, Dr. Smith went to Oxford, England, to present a paper to the ARAM Society about the walls of the Decapolis, then returned to Jordan for three more weeks of excavation. The excavation in the five-aisled church exposed a repertoire of pottery and liturgical artifacts and three mosaic floors with geometrical decorations that will need to be fully uncovered in future excavations. Dr. Smith observes, "While there are unique aspects to our individual pilgrimages through this life, we can benefit from observing the footprints of those who have preceded us.... In the Umayyad era of Abila we see that the Christian community can survive and even thrive in situations where the Faith is challenged. We also see that it is our spiritual construction in the Kingdom of God and not physical building projects that will last forever."
